# Negro Newspapers

A NYBODY might suppose when listening to the radio that Negroes spend the majority of their time dancing, singing comic songs or spirituals or reading the Bible. The fact is the amount of creditable literature produced weekly, bi-monthly, monthly, quarterly, semi-annually and annually by Negro enterprises for Negro readers is astonishing.

How many teachers, white and colored, in history and literature know the entire list of publications which has been developed by Negroes?

Considerable progress has been made by the Negro Press since the days when reading by a Negro was considered a crime. Intensely race-conscious, the Negro Press devotes itself exclusively to Negro news or news as it affects Negroes.

There are in the United States about 250 Negro publications—in Atlanta, Baltimore, Boston, Chicago, Dallas, Indianapolis, Kansas City, New York, Norfolk, Oklahoma City, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Richmond, St. Louis, Savannah, Washington—and in many other cities there are published various journals of substantial circulation. There are press bureaus especially for Negro newspapers, trade journals, religious and fraternal publications, high school and college papers, etc.

In 1863, there were only two newspapers in the United States published by colored persons. The first Negro newspaper published in the South, The Colored American, began publication at Augusta, Georgia, the first week in October, 1865, J. T. Shuftin was the editor. Only one of the Negro periodicals now being published, The Christian Recorder, was established before 1865. There are now about 250 periodicals published by or for Negroes.\*

In order to keep abreast of what is taking place relative to the Negro, one should read not only the mass of books continuously streaming from the press and the many articles appearing in the magazines about him, but also the Negro newspapers which more and more are tending to express more accurately than any other agency what the Negro is thinking and doing.\*\*
