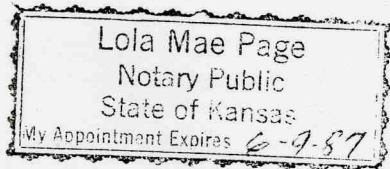

Buchanan closing 1959: When U.S.D. 501 closed Buchanan and sent all the children to Lowman Hill it thereby included in Lowman Hill all residential areas which the 1960 U.S. census indicates as having a majority of black residents in the Lowman Hill general area.

In 1956*, when the Aurbach elementary school in U.S.D. 501 had about 4% of the systems black children in it, Lowman Hill had 5.3% of the systems black elem. students and was growing at a rate of 8.5 additional black students per year while the system as a whole was growing at an average rate of only +3.0 black students at the elem. level. Lowman Hill was then 17.4% black and the system was 10.6% black.

In 1966* Lowman Hill was 49.63% black at a time when the U.S.D. 501 system was 16.49% black at the elementary level. And ^{by} at that time the U.S.D. 501 board had assigned % of the systems black students to Lowman Hill.

To facilitate the absorption of Buchanan into Lowman Hill the U.S.D. 501 opened a new school on the same site in 1959 replacing the original Lowman Hill

In 1962 the U.S.D. 501 built a completely new elem. school at Polk which opened over 90% white.

2. Washington Elem. closing of 1962: The U.S.D. 501 board chose to close Washington Elem. school and send the entire student complement of 179 to the Parkdale school.

In 1956* the Parkdale elem. school was 24.4% black while the U.S.D. 501 system was only 6.3% black at the elementary level and while the elem. system was growing at only 3 additional black children per year the Parkdale school was growing at

IN 1966* THE PARKDALE SCHOOL WAS 93.12% BLACK IN ITS STUDENTS COMPOSITION AND CONTAINED % OF ALL THE BLACK ELEM. STUDENTS IN U.S.D. 501.

3. LINCOLN ELEM. SCHOOL CLOSING 1963: THE U.S.D. 501 CLOSED THE LINCOLN ELEM. COMPARING THE GROWTH RATES IN BLACK STUDENTS AT THE TWO SCHOOLS BETWEEN 1956 & 1966 WILL SHOW THAT THE GRANT SCHOOL WAS EXPERIENCING A GROWTH IN BLACK STUDENT POPULATION OF 3 PER YEAR WHILE THE GROWTH RATE AT QUINCY WAS ONLY 1 PER YEAR.

IN 1966 THERE WERE 150 BLACK STUDENTS AT GRANT BUT ONLY 73 AT QUINCY

6. DAWSON CLOSING 1966: THE U.S.D. 501 CLOSE TO CLOSE THE DAWSON SCHOOL AND SEND THE PREDOMINANTLY WHITE STUDENT BODY TO THE RICE AND STATE STREET SCHOOLS WHICH WERE 3.0% & 25.52% BLACK RESPECTIVELY RATHER THAN TO THE LAFAYETTE ELEM. Buchanan - 1959-1960

The Buchanan school was closed and the children were reassigned to Lowman Hill.

Buchanan had 119 Black students in 1958-9. Lowman Hill gained 106 students in 1959-60 making it about 43% Black in student racial composition.

Immediately surrounding the Buchanan ~~and~~ and Lowman Hill attendance areas were the Potwin, Clay, Polk, Central Pk, Randolph and Green Elm schools.
