It is my pleasure to inform you that the FAMU Marching Band is available and it would be delighted to perform Pre-Game Show and Half-Time Pageant on the occasion of the Morris Brown College -- Florida A and M University Football Game on Saturday, October 13, 1962.

The obligations of Morris Brown College as sponsor - promoter are as follows:

1. TRANSPORTATION - Four (4) thirty-nine (39) Greyhound Traveler Buses based on 259 miles one way and 518 miles roundtrip (Tallahassee - Atlanta) at \$.60 per mile amounts to \$310.80 per bus and a total cost of \$1,243.20 for four buses.


