Dear Doctor Goode:

On our telephone conversation the other day, you asked for an outline of the administrative structure by which the hospital was governed. I have, on the appended sheet, given you such an outline. As you will see we have three main divisions which are all inter-related. First, there is the administrative division headed by the hospital superintendent which has to do with the general hospital administration and all its phases; and under him you have an assistant superintendent whose duties are suggested by his title, a purchasing agent and an admissions officer. The admissions officer is a fairly important person in out set up, because the solvency of our prospective patients is a very important point, and so the admissions officer and his staff will determine whether or not the patient will be admitted as an absolute indigent, or a modified indigent, or whether he will be admitted as a private patient.


