A man who lives his faith, Andrew Young received a bachelor of Divinity degree from Hartford Theological Seminary. Ordained by the United Church of Christ, he began his ministry as pastor of several Georgia and Alabama churches.

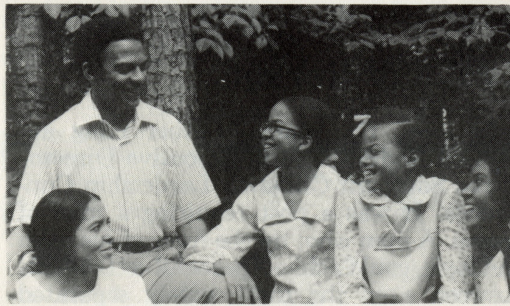
But Andrew Young's ministry soon spread. For four years he worked extensively with young people and athletes for the National Council of Churches. He represented the United States in meetings of the World Council of Churches in Europe, Asia, and South America. And he was chosen to go on the American Jewish Committee Study Tour of the Middle East.

Now Andrew Young's ministry is taking him to Congress. Why?

"There comes a time in a democratic society," he explains, "when you have to do more than preach. You have to try and make the Kingdom of God become incarnate in the life of society. And that means politics."

If we are to build a nation at peace—with good will to all men—we must have leaders whose faith means more than publicity appearances at church on Sunday mornings. We must have leaders who truly know and live their faith. The history of Andrew Young's ministry reveals just such a man.

"Immediate government, industrial, and corporate reform is essential if we are to reclaim a livable environment."

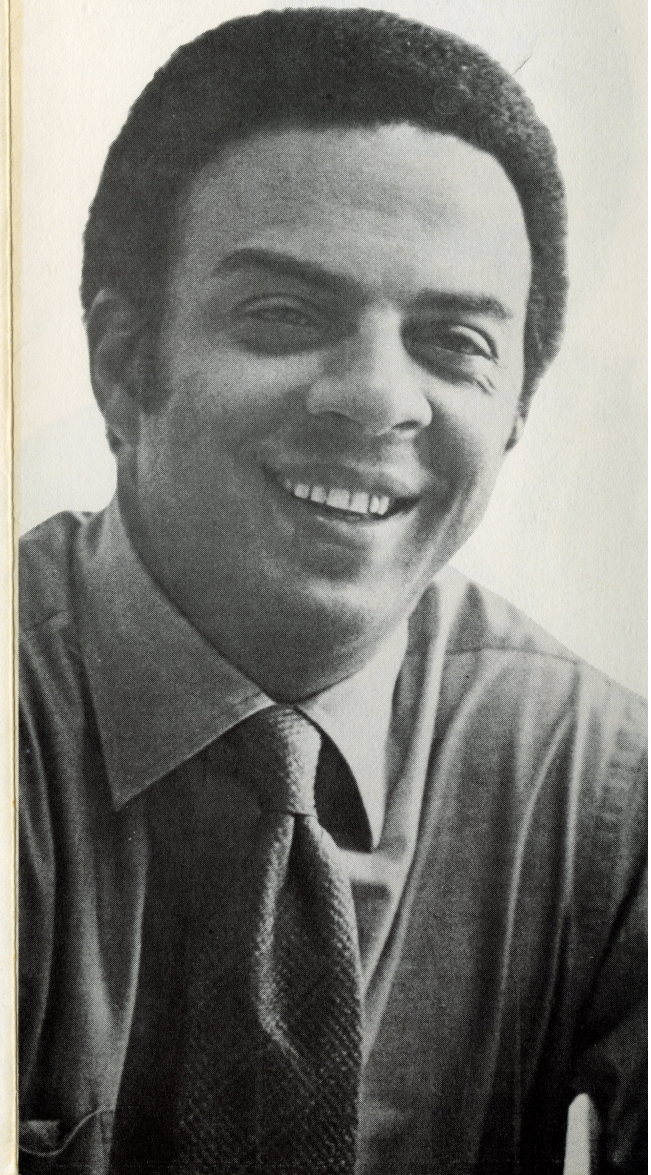
"The right of all working men to bargain collectively for wages and better conditions is essential in a democratic system."

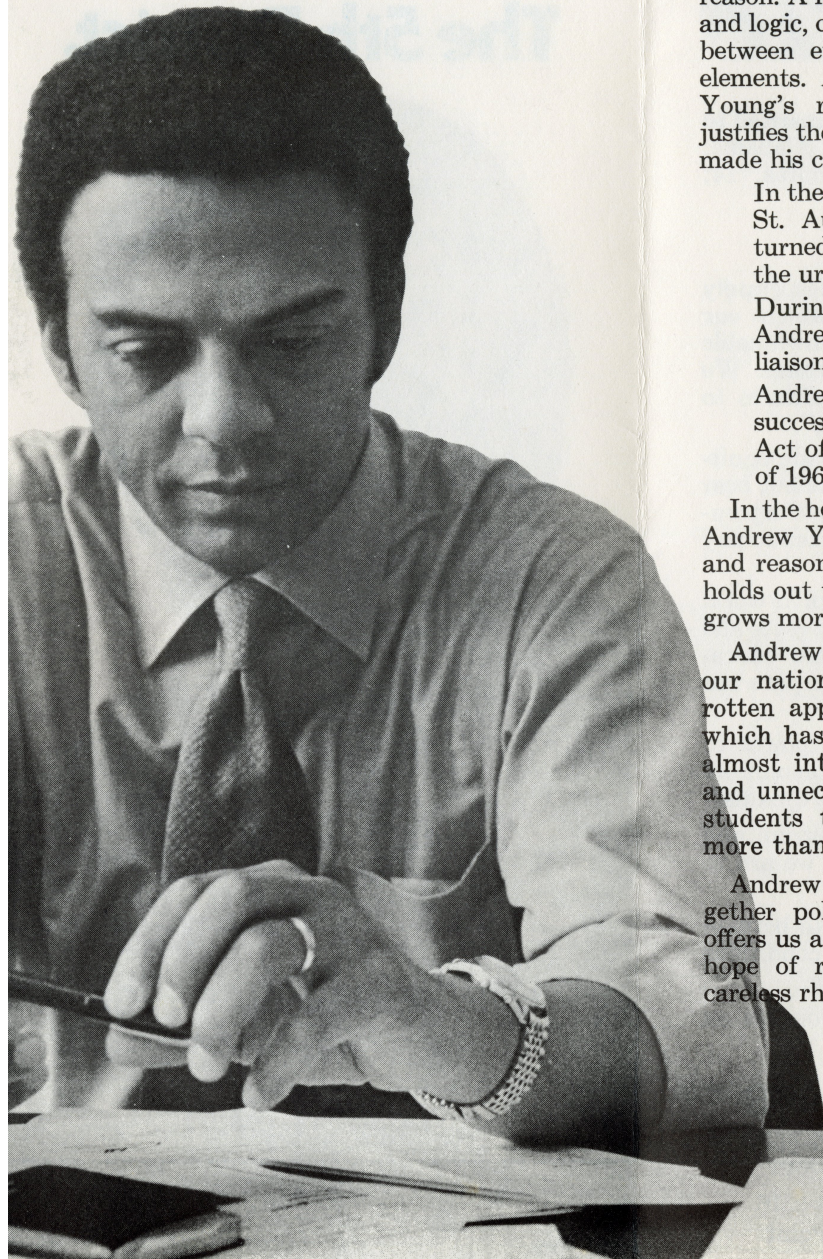

A Man of Reason.

LIn 1964, Dr. Martin Luther King appointed Andrew Young Executive Director of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. It was a post requiring a man of reason. A man who, by the force of his calm and logic, could achieve peaceful settlements between even the most widely separated elements. A look at just part of Andrew Young's record, before and since, well justifies the confidence with which Dr. King made his choice:

In the civil rights crises in Birmingham, St. Augustine, and Selma, Dr. King turned to Andrew Young to negotiate the urgently needed settlements.

During the Poor Peoples' Campaign, Andrew Young effectively served as liaison with the Federal Government.

Andrew Young participated in the successful drafting of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

In the hostile conflicts of the past decades, Andrew Young has shown that with calm and reason "We can work it out." He still holds out that same message today. And it grows more and more important.

Andrew Young has said: "Referring to our nation's young people as 'bums and rotten apples' contributes to the climate which has dangerously polarized America almost into armed camps." In the tragic and unnecessary deaths of six University students this year, he has been proven more than right.

Andrew Young's record of bringing together polarized segments of our society offers us a hope we must not let go . . . the hope of reason, rather than the ruin of careless rhetoric.

A Man of Action.

TIn Atlanta's labor disputes of 1966, 1968-70, Andrew Young worked behind the scenes for reconciliation and settlement. Quietly, without controversy, he played his part. Settling. Smoothing. Bringing people together.

This was Andrew Young in action . . . his kind of action. He found answers that worked, and got them through by the force of his faith and reason. It is the way Andrew Young has always responded to the needs of the people.

For example, he conducted voter registration drives in 13 states which resulted in over one million new voters. By their ballots these people are now beginning to non-violently bring about the changes in society which they so desperately need.

Andrew Young has also been instrumental in developing Operation Breadbasket and many other vitally needed housing and youth programs.

For over a generation wherever a man of action has been needed—Mississippi, Alabama, South Carolina, Georgia, Chicago, Cleveland, or his own city streets of Atlanta—Andrew Young has been there. Bringing faith. Bringing reason. Bringing answers.
