made. At this late date it would be impossible for the committee to change the set-up because the commencement program has been officially approved and all details worked out. I shall be pleased to refer the data to the committee for consideration at a subsequent commencement.

As you perhaps know, the Florida A and M College has not granted honorary degrees.

There is so much of tremendous importance going on, today, that here in my home in Florida, I still feel that I must pull my share of the load in the continuing struggle for full democracy for all, in this country, and for an extension of brotherhood throughout the world.

Because I feel this so strongly, I have decided to draw my friends around me through coorespondence which I am calling, THE MARY MCLEOD RETHUNE LETTERS, which you will receive from time to time. This is the first of these letters. Through them I want to reach out to my thousands of friends in all walks of life.

Sometimes, when I write, I shall be expressing my own views on many matters of general interest. Often I shall seek yours. At other times I shall be sharing with you the hours spent here in the midst of the work for the Mary McLeod Bethune Foundation -- sharing hours spent with my family, and with my many visitors and friends, on the campus of our Bethune-Cookman College, and along the waters of the beautiful Halifax River.

I hope to have many, many replies to these letters, so that I may know what is on your minds and hearts. Some of these replies, also, we can share— replies from all around the world -- growing stronger and wiser and extending our strength, in the sharing.

Just now, my great concern is that every one of us, here in the United States, go to the polls to vote, on the first Tuesday in November. Personally, I am going to vote for Governor Adlai Stevenson, because I believe that he will bring to the great office of Chief Executive, not only much-needed political experience and astuteness, but a fine, thoughtful, steadying influence that will draw people -- all our people -- more closely together, help to resolve our domestic problems, and promote harmony in our approach to international relations, in these critical times.

Whoever our choice may be, I pray that every man and woman on the long roll of my friends of every race and religion, will march to the polls and cast those votes that are the proud badge of firstclass citizenship in America.
