FACULTY WARRANT ISSUING PROCESS-TIME SPOT-CHECK

- I. Purpose: To ascertain length of time Faculty Members spend at Business Office picking up monthly payroll warrants.
- II. Method Used: All time-checks reported herein were made by stop-watch.
- III. Period Covered: The four hour period from \$:00 A. M. thru 12:00 Noon- May 1, 1951.
- IV. Number of salary warrants issued: 276
- V. Number of persons checked: 50

Note: This represents approximately every sixth person checked, with the exception of the five people reported in the block time-check. This appears to give a fairly representative check of the flow through the line.

VI. FINDINGS:

A. Seven (7) persons were checked for actual time spent at the window; signing salary requisition and picking up warrant only.

Time recorded here in this group ranged from eight (8) to fifty (50) seconds. The 50 second timing was for an employee who wrote a check at the window in payment of a bill due the College. The other 6 in this group were timed within the range of 8 to 18 seconds.

- B. One (1) person was timed from the end of a line of ten (10) people through the warrant issue process at $2\frac{1}{2}$ minutes. This represents one of the few times that the line was long during the period checked.
- C. Thirty-eight (38) persons were checked from the time they entered the line through the time they received their warrants.

Time recorded here in this group ranged from three (3) seconds to one (1) minute and thirty-five (35) seconds. Four (4) people in this group were served within the 1 minute to 1 minute 35 second range; the balance ranging within the 3 to 58 seconds timing. The one 58 second timing in this group was for an individual who gave up his place in line to allow two ladies to proceed ahead of him. Some of the people in this group also wrote checks for bills due the College.

D. Five (5) persons were checked in a block, and it was found that they were served in one (1) minute and six and a half $(6\frac{1}{2})$ seconds.

NOTE: The usual procedure of having one Business Office Employee dispense the monthly salary warrants was used during the period reported herein.


