THIRTEEN HAVE TESTIFIED IN THE RIOT PROBE

of Two White Mon and Six Nogross at Rosewood, Levy County, in January, Will Hear 25 Additional Witnesses Today—Few Nogross Have Returned Since the Riots.

Bronson, Feb. 11.—(By the Associated Press).—Thirteen witnesses testified today before the special grand jury empaneled by Judge A. V. Long to investigate the Rosewood rice clash the early part of January, in which two white men and six negroes were killed.

George A. DeCottes, state attorney of the seventh judicial circuit, who went here by Gov. Hardee to assume the investigation, declined to nich to say whether any evidence had been obtained on which indictments could be based. He said he could not discuss the progress being made, other than to say the trouble was being investigated thoroughly.

Twenty-five witnesses have been summoned to appear before the grand jury tomorrow. Eight negroes also will be called to tell the body what they know of the trouble, Mr. De-

Following the burning of the negro section of Rosewood after the clash, all the negroes fied to the woods. According to information received by Mr. DeCottes, virtually all of them have remained away, although he said he had been informed that a few had returned.

Mr. DeCottes could not say how long the investigation will last.
