Mrs. White and Mrs. Smith are teaching at Topeka High, Miss Shideler is instructing music at Crane Junior High and Mrs. Powers is teaching at Gage. Moore, a Washburn law student, is teaching half-time at Boswell.

The board discussed a formal statement on its ten-year plan for improving Topeka school buildings and facilities. The statement will soon appear in pamphlet form and be distributed to the public through school children and civic groups.

Preparation of the formal and complete statement on the plan is to give the general public as complete information as possible as to what is included in the ten points of the plan. As board president Marlin Casey's introduction states, the board wishes the public to know "What the plan is, and what it isn't."

The board discussed at length the property it is acquiring for a new athletic field at Quinton Heights for a stadium and new school building. The board did not decide to accept the appraisers' report as to the values assigned the property it recently condemned. President Casey was given the power to accept in whole or in part, or appeal the report. However, the board will try to receive title to the property as early as possible in order to begin rough grading on the project. Ted Greist was named architect for the project.
