 - 1. Total number of students transferred
 - 2. The number of students that were White
 - 3. The number of students that were Black
 - 4. The number of students that were other minority
 - 5. Describe and accompany a map with a demarcation of the portion of the attendance zone for the transferring school that was incorporated into the attendance zone for the receiving school

- m. Schools from which students were reassigned or transferred to this school and for each school from which students were reassigned to the school state:
 - 1. Total number of students reassigned
 - 2. The number of students that were White
 - 3. The number of students that were Black
 - 4. The number of students that were other minority

ANSWER:

Neither School District records nor other available documents reviewed disclosed any reliable information from which an answer to these interrogatories can be derived. For further substantiation of the unavailability of records from which to derive the information sought by these interrogatories, see the original answer of Unified School District No. 501 served on intervening plaintiffs on May 5, 1981.

- 10. For each school year from 1940-41 to [1949-50], state:
 - a. How the School District determined what school a student attended
 - b. The criterion utilized to establish the attendance zones for the school
- 11. For each school in existence and for each school during the school years from 1940-41 to [1949-50], state the specific criteria stated in Interrogatory 10(b) above that was utilized to establish the attendance zone for the particular school.

ANSWER:

It appears that from 1940 to 1950, White students were assigned to attend their neighborhood school determined by their parent(s) residence. During this time period, Black students at the elementary level were required to attend one of the following schools: Buchanan, located at 12th and Buchanan; McKinley, located at 915 North Western; Monroe, located at 15th and Monroe; and Washington, located at 1021 Washington Street. While it does not appear that there were any definite attendance boundaries for these schools, it seems to be an assumption that Black elementary school children in north Topeka (north of the Kansas River) attended McKinley School; children in the south and central Topeka area attended Buchanan; and children in east Topeka attended either Monroe or Washington. On September 8, 1953, prior to the United States Supreme Court decision herein, the Board of Education of Topeka Public Schools began a series of four steps to terminate segregation in the elementary schools. Information regarding this action is contained in the original answer of Unified School District No. 501 to these interrogatories, served on intervening plaintiffs on July 3, 1981.

In addition, during the 1940-41 school year, the four schools listed above provided for the education of seventh and eighth grade Black students. Upon completion of the eighth grade, Black students attended the neighborhood junior high schools of the School District. White children in the City of Topeka were provided with what was known as the 6-3-3 system of education; that is, six years of elementary or grade school, three years of junior high school, and three years of senior high school. Black children were educated under a system which might be referred to as the 8-1-3 plan; that is, grade school through the first eight grades, then to the same junior high school attended by White children for the ninth year. The Black children attended senior high school with White children. After the Kansas Supreme Court decision in Graham v. Board of Education, 153 Kan. 840, 114 P.2d 313 (1941), beginning with the 1941-42 school year, seventh and eighth grade Black children attended the same junior high schools attended by White children.

ANSWER:

The official minutes of the Board of Education mention the authorization, amendment, and the deletion of optional attendance areas at various times in the period 1940 to 1949. The practice of using optional attendance areas and/or enrollment policy was probably used by the Board of Education to ameliorate the situation created for the families with children attending the original schools serving their residence, but who were displaced by the Board action, reassigning their residence to another school attendance area.

This researcher was not able to document a clear statement of the District's enrollment and attendance policy for 1940.

Therefore, it has been difficult to assess the effect of Board policy changes or the reassignment of attendance area boundaries cited in the Board minutes for the period between 1940 and 1950.

26. For each school year from 1940-41 to 1979-80, state the School District's policy other than that stated in Interrogatory No. 18 with regard to transfer of students from one school within the District to another school within the District, both upon a change of student residence and without a change of student residence.

ANSWER:

Incomplete data thwarts an accurate answer to this interrogatory. Attached hereto is a comparison of the effect of the Kansas Supreme Court decision in <u>Graham v. Board of Education</u>, 153 Kan. 840, 114 P.2d 313 (1941), upon the affected schools; namely, a comparison of the school year enrollments for the 1940-41 and the 1941-42 school years.

- 27. For each policy stated in Interrogatory No. 26 and for each school year from 1940-41 to [1949-50], state each school which the student transferred pursuant to the policy and for each school state:
 - a. Total number of students transferring pursuant to the policy
