

HERITAGE

Just south of Tallahassee, in an area formerly known as Belair, Florida, there is a small, forlorn church building, no longer used as a house of worship. Tin-roofed and weather-worn, the building is barely visible to passing motorists and is remembered by only a few of the local citizenry. Yet, despite its obscurity, the church represents 125 years of rich and instructive heritage.

Founded prior to the Civil War by Rev. James Page, a slave belonging to Col. John Parkhill of Leon County, the church was well known during the period 1851-1885. On February 15, 1853, the <u>Florida Sentinel</u> reported the Rev. Page as "one of the most popular colored preachers hereabouts."

In 1870 Rev. Page left Belair to found the Bethel Baptist Church a short distance north of old Tallahassee. Upon his death, March 14, 1883, Rev. Page was buried in the old City Cemetary of Tallahassee, with "a large concourse of colored and white citizens, aggregating about three thousand persons," attending the funeral.

The original Belair church (called Bethlehem) continued in existence well into this century. In direct line of descent, a small band of hardy souls carries on work today, led by Rev. B. F. Walker. In 1937 Rev. W. S. Lewis led his people in the rebuilding of the church, using many of the axe-hewn timbers from the original structure. Now a storage shed on the property of Mr. and Mrs. Charles F. Johnson, who are donating the building for this Bicentennial project, the church still shelters the old pulpit and pews. An aged and deteriorating foot-pump organ stands silent, reminiscent of earlier days when music filled the air.

Alleged to be the "oldest colored church in the state," the building now awaits the caring hands of those who will preserve it as an important part of Florida history and deep south Black culture. Through this brochure a general appeal is being issued for community assistance in the completion of this Bicentennial restoration project. Your help is needed. EFFORTS TO PRESERVE THE BETHLEHEM BAPTIST CHURCH HAVE ALREADY BEGUN:

- 1. The restoration of the church is an official project of the Area of Philosophy and Religion and of the Bicentennial Planning Committee of Florida A&M University.
- 2. The project has been approved by the Bicentennial Committee of Leon County, and it has been recognized and partially funded (\$4,500) by the Bicentennial Commission of Florida.
- 3. The project has received the endorsement of the Tallahassee Ministerial Association.
- 4. The Tallahassee Junior Museum has provided a site where the church will stand as a permanent historical attraction.
