Born and reared in the Delta

Robert Clark was born and raised in Holmes County. His father was a school teacher fired from several jobs for helping to register and teach black people to vote. His grandfather was a preacher who was run out of Hinds County for speaking against segregation.

"They always told me things would change when young men and women would have the courage to stand up and make them change," Robert Clark recalls. "And from the time I was just a kid, I always wanted to carry on their work."

He has always been a hard worker

Robert Clark attended Jackson State University with the help of a track scholarship and a 25¢/hour custodian's job. After graduation, he taught and coached athletics at Humphreys County Training School for seven years before entering graduate school.

He earned a Master's Degree in education at Michigan State University, and then did additional graduate work at the University of Michigan. Returning to Mississippi, Representative Clark worked as a principal at several public schools in the Delta and then as the athletic director of Saints Junior College in Lexington.

Representative Clark left teaching and coaching in the mid-'60s to become director of the Holmes County anti-poverty program, the job he held until his election to the state legislature in 1967.

A widower and single parent, Robert Clark has two sons, Bryant Wondrick, 9, and Robert III, 12. He supplements his modest legislative salary by working on his small farm in Lexington.

ABSENTEE BALLOT VOTING

The purpose of this memo is to remind you to see that the ABSENTEE BALLOT is available to all persons who will not be able to go to the polls to vote in person on November 6.

Primary Targets

- 1. Students attending college out of state or outside of the district.
- 2. Physically incapacitated (sick and shut-ins).
- 3. Persons who will be out of state or more than fifty miles away from home working or on business or accompanying spouse on business.
- 4. Persons on military duty and their dependents who are eligible to vote.

Things to Do

- 1. Pick up package of applications from the voter registrars office.
- 2. Have the announcement about absentee ballots made in all club meetings, community meetings and church gatherings.
- 3. Make phone calls to key leaders around the county. Ask them to assist you in determing the names and addresses of persons who need absentee ballots.
- 4. Distribute absentee ballot applications.
- Assist applicants where possible in receiving the services of a Notary Public.

- 6. Remind persons who will be out of town that they can vote in person during office hours of the registrar any time between now and noon on November 3, 1984.
- 7. Contact all Ministers: ask them to advise sick and shut-in about absentee ballots. Take applications if no one in the family can do it.
- 8. Contact all Nursing Homes and Homes for Aged: see that those who can't go to the polls get absentee ballots. Be careful when dealing with those who are senile. They could cause problems if they forget that they have voted.

Remember

Tom Bradley won the Governorship of California among people who actually went to the polls in 1982. But had it taken away when the mostly REPUBLICAN absentee ballots were counted. Democrats can vote absentee also, it is our right. Let's not overlook the absentee ballots.

The Ten Commitments of Ronald Reagan

- (7) I Shall Remember the Elderly for They Built America

 The 1983 Reagan budget proposed a 45% cut in housing assistance for the elderly (Section 202).
- (8) I Shall Pay Tribute to the American Farmer for He Feeds America.


 Farmers' net income is down by nearly 50%. Farm exports are down by over 25% and farm net worth has been reduced by about one-third. Ronald Reagan imposed economic sanctions against Soviet Poland which embargoed American farm products in 1981. The overvalued dollar which prices U.S. farm products out of the world markets is a trade barrier greater than was embargoes imposed under Nixon, Ford or Carter before Reagan.
- (9) I Shall Rebuild the American Military Might and Restore U.S. Prestige Abroad
 In 1983 the U.S. Marines were forced out of Lebanon, a friendly country to which they were
 invited. American servicemen died, the power of a Russian ally, Syria, was increased, the defense of Israel was jeopardized and American prestige declined in Western Europe and the
 Middle East. A secret war continues in Central America which threatens to become a regional
 conflict.
- (10) I Shall Balance the Federal Budget by 1983.

 Ronald Reagan's deficit is larger than all deficits of all previous presidents added together. The 1985 deficit is \$175 billion forecasted to go over \$200 billion next year.



RE: The Final Weekend Caravan

Between 9 a.m., Friday, November 2, and 7 p.m., Sunday, November 4, I plan to make at least one stop in each of the 22 counties of District 2.

The purpose of this caravan is to boost the spirit of our workers, increase voter interest in each county, and support the candidacy of friendly democratic candidates for local offices in the various localities in District 2.

Makeup of Caravan

1. Representative Clark

2. Surrogate for Mondale and Surrogate for Winter

3. National political and civil rights leaders

4. State political and civil rights leaders

5. Candidates for local and county office

Timing of Rallies and Meetings

All rallies will begin at least one half hour prior to the arrival of the main CARAVAN. An advance party will arrive at the site of the rally well in advance of the main contingent. It is also quite possible that the rally could continue after the CARAVAN moves on toward the next city.

Local musical groups (choirs, bands, combos, etc.) should be secured by the local committee to help attract and hold the crowd.

A representative from the campaign office will be in touch with the leadership in each county to arrange the details.

Because of the national interest in this campaign, it is quite possible that press will be traveling with the CARAVAN. It is therefore very important that a large show of strength be visible at each spot. It is better to have a small space which is crowded than to have a large crowd which fills only half of the room. Narrow spots are easier to fill than large open spaces. To cameras, perception of a crowd is as important as the crowd.

Possible Rally Sites

- 1. Courthouse steps
- 2. Town square
- 3. Schools or colleges
- 4. Large factories or plants at shift change time or at lunch time
- 5. Shopping centers or other places where crowds are already present
- 6. Regular meetings in progress (church services, campaign leaders' meetings, etc.)
- 7. Special events (fish fries, banquets, prayer breakfasts, etc.)

NOTE: IT IS IMPORTANT TO LOCATE RALLIES CLOSE TO MAIN HIGHWAY

Things Needed for Outdoor Rally

- 1. Portable stage or platform (a truck could serve this purpose if no other is easily available)
- 2. Public address system (a sound truck or car with speaker hooked to CB will serve if one is not available from a local school or church, etc.)
- 3. Red, white, and blue crepe paper to decorate truck or platform (balloons, Clark, Winter, Mondale/Ferraro signs--also local candidates' signs)
- 4. Handmade and printed signs for local candidates and Robert Clark--also for Winter, Mondale/Ferraro
- 5. Literature, marked sample ballots, other handouts
- 6. Live or recorded music and speeches ("I Have A Dream", etc.)
- 7. Police escorts who can meet the CARAVAN at the town limit or county line will add to the excitement and may help save time.
