I have been asked to determine the proportion of current Florida residents who were living in Florida in 1923.

Using official United States census data, computer resources, and commonly accepted demographic techniques, I have determined that approximately 1.5 percent of today's state population were Florida residents in 1923. A summary of my methodology and subconclusions to the proposed questions as set forth in the attached one page report.

QUESTION

What proportion of current Florida residents were living in Florida in 1923, the year of the Rosewood incident?

METHOD

Available demographic data do not allow an exact answer to this question, because there are no surveys that ask respondents for their state of residence in 1923. It is possible to arrive at a good approximation, however, by using data from the 1990 US Census (specifically, the 1% Public Use Microdata Sample) to answer a slightly different question.

Approximating an answer to the original question requires two steps. First, change the question to "What proportion of 1990 Florida residents were living in Florida in 1923?" This change will almost certainly lead to an overestimate of the answer to the original question above, since the population born prior to 1923 was 67+ years old in 1990, and many of these people have died during the interval between the 1990 census and the present.

Among 1990 Florida residents who were 67+ years old, we next need to identify the proportion who were also Florida residents in 1923. As noted, there are no available data that allow an exact answer to this question. However, we can approximate by identifying the proportion of 67+ year old Floridians who were Florida residents at birth.

Errors caused by equating residence at birth with residence in 1923 will be small, and will also be partially self-cancelling. Approximation errors will be small because interstate migration of young children is a relatively rare event, and among Floridians 67+ in 1990 the majority (63%) were less than ten years old in 1923. These small approximation errors will be made even smaller because they partially offset one another. Equating place of birth with place of 1923 residence yields one approximation error (inclusion of Florida natives who had left the state between birth and 1923, and later returned) that will lead to a slight overestimate of the answer to the original question, and another approximation error (exclusion of non-Florida natives who had already moved to Florida by 1923) that will lead to a slight underestimate.

APPROXIMATE ANSWER

Using the method above, census data indicate that among 1990 residents of Florida,

- * 16.0% were alive in 1923
- * approximately 1.5% were Florida residents in 1923
- * approximately 1.1% were white Florida residents in 1923
- * approximately 0.05% were adult (21+) Florida residents in 1923
- * approximately 0.04% were white adult (21+) Florida residents in 1923

As a result of demographic changes in Florida between 1990 and 1994 (viz. deaths of those born prior to 1923, new births, and positive net in-migration), the above numbers are likely to be overestimates of the corresponding proportions for 1994.

INTERPRETATION

The demographic facts are simple and intuitive. Approximately 5 out of every 6 Florida residents were not alive at the time of the Rosewood incident. Among current residents of Florida who were alive in 1923, most were then children (over 95% were under 21 years old in 1923), and most were then living outside of Florida.

CHAPTER 8406—(No. 11).

AN ACT for the relief of Dr. W. H. Cox, State Health Officer of the State of Florida, for the Loss of Salary, Fees and Traveling Expenses Prior to and Subsequent to His Unlawful Suspension from the Said Office.

Whereas, On the 6th day of June, 1917, pursuant to the laws of this State, Dr. W. H. Cox was employed by the State Board of Health as State Health Officer of the State of Florida for a period of four years, unless removed by the said Board for cause; and

Whereas, On August 23, 1919, the said W. H. Cox was suspended from the office of State Health Officer on an executive order, or writ of ouster signed by the then Governor of Florida, which was without authority and unauthorized under the law of this State; and

Whereas, the State Board of Health of Florida had a secret or called meeting at Tallahassee, Florida, on the 23rd day of June, 1919, without notice to the State Health Officer, and for no cause known to the said State Health Officer, was reported to have dispensed with the services of the said officer; and

Whereas, During the time that elapsed from June 23rd to August 23rd, 1919, the said W. H. Cox was performing the duties of the State Health Officer, and incurred traveling expenses to the amount of Two Hundred and Ninetythree Dollars (\$293.00), none of which has ever been paid; and

Whereas, the law of this State provides that the State Health Officer shall be employed for a period of four

Wilkerson Video Tape

Reply to Question and Statements submitted to the Rosewood Investigative Team by Mr. Peters

The team has already responded to 90 interrogatories given to us by Mr. Peters. We are glad to respond to additional statements that Mr. Peters has made, and we prefer to do so in our own words. Our responses are a joint effort of the team with the exception of Dr. David Colburn who is in Madrid. We are faxing him these responses and are convinced that he will agree with them. Dr. Maxine Jones, Principal Investigator, will read our responses.

- 1. The team states that this article was carried in the St. Petersburg Evening Independent, January 5, 1923, and that it was one of several articles describing the January 4, shooting. Yet, there is testimony from eyewitnesses who were in the Carrier house that most of the occupants were women and children. That there were 25 heavily armed blacks and the statement that Andrews and Wilkerson were shot to death without warning is an extreme version of events and could not be used and was not accepted by the team as being the correct version.
- 2. The team was unable to determine all of the circumstances by which Andrews and Wilkerson were killed as they started to enter the Carrier house. But such a declaration as that made by Jason McElveen about the intent and anger of the whites who went to the Carrier house make it impossible for the team to state that it was just as likely that the whites had peaceful intentions as that they were aggressors. See Jason McElveen Tape. See also Ernest Parham Interview, Appendices, 353, and Ernest Parham's testimony before a Special Master's hearing in Tallahassee, Florida, on Friday, March 11, 1994.

The following answer applies to questions 3 and 4 which are interrelated.

The article is from the New York <u>Age</u>, January 13, 1923, and since it contains various statements that could not be verified, the team could not accept its accuracy. The team could not authenticate that 18 people were captured and taken away for safekeeping. The article itself does not say who the alleged people were--whether they were men, women or children. This is only one of several accounts. There were eyewitnesses, none of whom, made any statement about 18 people being captured. See Sworn Statements of Langley, Davis and Goins.

The following answer applies to questions 5 and 6 which are interrelated.

The number of lynchings that did occur is a shocking total. The team wrote several versions of its report as it progressed in its research, adding and deleting as it went along. The report by Monroe N. Work applied to the total number of lynchings from 1922 to 1924 and was deleted with other material

through the editing process because it was not central to the Rosewood study.

- 7. The team received Dr. Shakir's Rosewood Family History.
- 8. Professor Rogers states that he has met Dr. Shakir only once. That was when the Rosewood survivors and family members came to Tallahassee. He did not interview her, and their acquaintanceship is only slight. Dr. Shakir's Rosewood Family History is a good overview, but its focus is narrow and related from the family's point of view. The team using the Historical Method used a much larger variety of primary and secondary sources.

The following answer applies to questions 9 and 10 which are interrelated.

The team turned in its report on December 22, 1923, and therefore the Wilkerson Interview could not be included. Yet, Ernest Parham disputes that Mr. Wilkerson was there on a peacekeeping mission by invitation. Ernest Parham's testimony before a Special Master's hearing in Tallahassee, Florida, on Friday, March 11, 1994.

11. Since the report of the Grand Jury does not exist or has yet to be discovered, the team was unable to make any conclusions. The team used newspaper articles stating that no True Bill was returned, and in fact, there were no indictments relating to the Rosewood incident.
